



EDUCATION MATTERS | READING SUCCESS

WILSON LANGUAGE READING PROGRAM©

What is the biggest single predictor of a child's success in school? The answer is phonemic awareness, and reading assessments for South Bend Community school students indicate they know their sounds! For ten years the Foundation has stayed the course to implement the innovative research from the National Institutes of Child Health and Development (NICHD) indicating how children learn to read. The research was clear – the strongest impact on student learning was the continuing professional development of their teachers in reading.

In 2003, Dr. James Wilson was frustrated with the lack of reading skills by children and decided that it was time to do, "Whatever it takes," to help children learn to read. Together, our community has helped to raise the 2.2M over ten years to make sure the training and materials were made available for the teachers and students. To date, the total number of teachers trained over ten years is 1,018 (includes parochial special education teachers) which has been accomplished through generous public support, and our hard working teachers and students.

In addition, literacy coaches are involved in the two-year practicum that will enable them to provide the on-going support for every primary center to create long-term sustainability of the program. This approach includes a long-term goal to select one or two literacy coaches to be trained at the highest level to include the "trainer of trainers" model. We can't thank Phyllis Largey enough for her dedication to seeing this long term goal through. She will be retiring at the end of the 2014-2015 school-year and will be greatly missed. The long-term goal has been that the trainers will permanently sustain the program, so that outside trainer fees will no longer be paid for routine reading training.

Thank you for your citizenship and support to make certain that our community leaves a legacy of literary achievement for our children. Education matters.



EDUCATION NOURISHES FUTURE PROGRAMING SUPPORT

One of the important functions of the Education Foundation is supporting and engaging the staff of the SBCSC and learning opportunities for children. Programming Chair, Noel Yarger has led the committee through a year-long process of researching potential curriculum to supplement the existing curriculum. Several programs have risen to the top over the last year that will be implemented in year three of our current strategic plan. One of the programs is called Character Education Partnership, or as it's called "CEP."

CEP uses the term, "character education" to:

Encompass the wide set of educational approaches shared by groups who promote character education, including moral education, just communities, and caring communities, groups that share a common commitment to helping young people develop their capacity to be responsible and caring citizens.

Data (from schools that have implemented the CEP program) show a decrease in discipline problems, dropout rates decline, and an increase in teaching time and student responsibility. This long term process involves the students, staff, parents and community in the fostering of character development.

Thanks to board directors, Noel Yarger, Dick Pfeil and Barbara Warner, a pilot is underway at Riley High School and Dickinson Fine Arts Academy. We are also pleased to announce that Dick Pfeil has agreed to match up to \$6,000 for Character Education Partnership training.

EDUCATION COUNTS | WORLD-CLASS MATH

"Singapore Math is a math curricula centered on problem solving that emphasizes computational skills as well as conceptual and strategic thinking processes and compared to U.S. textbooks, Singapore Math provide more in-depth coverage of a relatively small number of topics. Curricula for the secondary level follow a more integrated approach, where concepts and examples from algebra and geometry are introduced progressively at each grade level."



EDUCATION INSPIRES | MENTORING

EVERY CHILD WHO NEEDS A MENTOR WILL HAVE ONE

Mentoring Mission: "To connect students with caring adults to help them achieve success in school and reach their dreams."

What is a Mentor?

Anyone over the age of 18 may mentor after completing a one hour training session and a background check. You will be paired with a 1st through 4th grade student, after the guardian signs the permission form.

How does it work?

Our mentors and mentees meet for one hour a day, one day a week, during the school year, at the student's school. They share in activities such as reading, writing stories, playing games, and just talking. The City of South Bend recognizes the Education Foundation's Mentoring Program as an integral part of their Mentor South Bend initiative.

What Changed?

The Foundation brings stability and continuity to the Mentoring Program, while building on past successes of founding members Bill Przybysz and Coach Digger Phelps. In July an agreement was signed to bring the Mentoring Program under the Education Foundation's umbrella.

EDUCATION EMPOWERS THE IMPACT OF TEACHER GRANTS

The Teacher Grant Program is an on-going strategic plan goal for the Foundation. This grant program responds to requests from individual teachers for funding of student-teacher projects, or for the funding of equipment to enhance classroom teaching. Last year, one of the teacher's grants funded an innovative dulcimer music project. The grant funds allowed the students to build dulcimers themselves, and then after learning how to play the instrument, they performed

together. The Navarre School students eventually provided excellent musical entertainment at our Foundation's Great Friends of Schools spring luncheon. The following report was submitted by Doreen Denney, the teacher recipient of the "Dulcimer Days" teacher grant.

"When we came back in August, I greeted my students with the greatest news ever! I told them we would be learning to play a new instrument. I immediately had the attention of all of my students and curiosity twinkled in their eyes. They sat up taller in their seats and strained to see what instrument I held in my hands. From there, I taught them so many things. Things about music, things about work habits, things about life.... And I had the chance to spark a small flame that turned into a passionate fire as their curiosity inspired them to learn. I was able to do this because of the South Bend Public Education Foundation and the James D. Metz Fine Arts Teacher Grant, and I will forever be grateful."

Ann and I have seen the importance of these teacher grants, and as a result we plan to continue our support of these interesting projects.
